

November 1981 – A Month of Solidarity and Action

This fall the East Timor Human Rights Committee (ETHRC) and the Pacific Concerns Research Center (PCRC) will be organizing an international month of action on East Timor. The month that has been target ed is November 1981 during which the U.N. will be debating and voting on this year's resolution on East Timor. November 28th is also the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence of the Democratic Republic of East Timor.

The objective of this proct is to coordinate a united
atement of concern and opposition to Indonesia's occupation and policies in East Timor. Through public education
and demonstrations, the question of East Timor can be rais
-ed before many new people and
organizations.

As it is now envisioned, the ETHRC, the PCRC and at least one other organization will mail out a RESOURCE PACK-ET to all of their interested contacts (see insert). These



packets will probably include a poster, background pieces, leaflets, maps, slides and 8x 10 photographs relating to the situation in East Timor.

These packets will be provided to any group or individual who wants to organize some type of activity for the November action. There is no charge for the packets although contributions are sorely needed. To get a packet, fill out and return the inserted page.

The ETHRC will be taking responsibility for organizing activities in the U.S. and throughout Europe. The PCRC coordinating be activities of their contacts Pacific the Basin and we are working with the Asian Forum on Human Rights coordinate activities in Asia.

To facilitate these activities, speakers from the ETHRC will be available to speak in communities throughout the U.S. throughout October, November and early December. If you are interested in hosting a speaker, contact us. As always, such speaking trips to communities have to pay for themselves, coordinating such a visit with other organizations or universities helps to offset travel and other expenses.

If people are willing to make this effort at this time, it can have a significant effect. All participating groups will be asked to send back a report on their activities. These will be compiled and pub-lished in a November Action Project Report.

We are sure that the Action and the Action Report will help to raise the profile of the issue of East Timor in both national and international circles.

People's Tribunal Verdict

successor to the Betrand Russell Tribunals which were founded by Betrand Russell and Jean Paul Sartre. The precepts of the Tribunal are heavily based on the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Recent Tribunal hearings have been on the Philippines, El Salvador and the invasion of Afghanistan.

Although the Tribunal's verdict has no power of enforcement, it is nonetheless significant. It is the first time that an inter -national body has recognized the reality of the genocide in East Timor on the firm and "incontrovertable" evidence of diplomats, law -vers, experts and refugees. The findings of the Tribunal are sure to stir activities on East Timor, especially in Europe where the Tribunal is based.

In its closing remarks, the Tribunal

noted Australia's complicity not only because of its failure to help East Timor despite its ability to do so but also because the Government has placed Australian-Indonesian relations above the rights of the East Timorese Concerning the governments of Western Europe the Tribunal noted that money given to Indonesia by the Inter-governmental Group on Indonesia (IGGI) for domestic programs had been used by Indonesia to purchase Lockheed C-130 military aircraft which were used to transport troops and equipment into East Timor.

Finally, the Tribunal noted the special responsibility that Portugal had to assure that East Timor achieved its independence.

The Tribunal encouraged "all governments and organizations to provide assistance and aid to East Timor" in order to offset the crimes of those governments and agencies which assist Indonesia to continue its occupation.

The Subcommittee on Petitions, Information and Assistance of the Special Committee on Decolonization heard testimony from AMNESTY INTERNATION-AL, INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE FOR HUMAN RIGHTS and CLERGY AND LAITY CONCERNED on East Timor. The CALC testimony was prepared and presented by the East Timor Human Rights Committee, which is working closely with CALC on East Timor. In the testimonies, the U.N. was urged to increase its informational coverage of East Timor in its publications, give increased attention to assisting the East Timorese and to prepare a documentary film on East Timor.

PERMANENT PEOPLES' TRIBUNAL SESSION ON EAST TIMOR

Verdict:
Indonesia and the U.S.
GUILTY

In a forty page verdict delivered on June 23rd, the Permanent People's Tribunal foun de the Government of Indonesia guilty of violating international law and human rights and the U.S. government, along with Australia and many Western European governments, guilty of complicity in these acts.

Most of the document was spent in detail -ing the historical, political and legal back -ground for the final decision. In the devel -opment of the verdict, the Tribunal conferred its recognition of the Maubere (Timorese) people as a national group, the legitimacy of the Democratic Republic of East Timor and the status of Fretilin as the unique representative of the East Timorese in their struggle for self-determination.

Citing the testimonies of several witnesses, the Tribunal found the Government of Indonesia guilty of several specific charges, including violations of the U.N. Charter, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Geneva Convention.

In addition, the Tribunal spent five pages detailing the specific actions, motives and consequences of U.S. complicity in the crimes. The Tribunal pointed out that the U.S. government has consistently supplied mil—itary and diplomatic support to Indonesia at crucial times. The Tribunal felt that the

U.S.

"systematic subordination of the needs and

"systematic subordination of the needs and rights of the people" was due to the interests of U.S. "political imperialism" which was also evident in Indochina, throughout Asia and in "Africa and Latin America too."

The Tribunal had called on Indonesia to present its defense, but it refused to respond. In its place, Michael Chamberlain of the ETHRC was asked to compile and prepare a statement on Indonesia's position.
